This Year's Slate of Officers





Coffee filters, dryer sheets (used) help prevent soil leaking out of holes in flower pots. Broken crockery can go on top of the sheets.

Addition of diatomaceous earth, (fossilized shells that can be found in some plant stores) deter some soil

pests like ants and slugs. This is a poison-free approach on a small scale (pots and containers).

Your old window shades may be assigned to a second life as plant labels. Cut them in 6 inch strips for outside use and use a permanent "sharpie" to write the name of your plant. In case of fading (permanent does not always mean light-fast) write the name a second time on the underground part of your label. Pencil may work as well.

The Bicentennial Rose



There is a special 1812 rose for sale at this year's Ontario Horticultural Association convention in honour of the bicentennial of the War of 1812.

The rose is a scented floribunda called Korcasima, a new variety with long lasting red flowers and attractive foliage. It has good disease resistance, grows into a 2 to 3 foot bush with abundant repeating flowers.

Potted plants are \$20 and bare rooted plants are \$15. The deadline to order rose bushes is March 15, 2012. They are shipped April 16. If you'd like to have an 1812 rose bush, please talk to Florence Bell before March 15.

By the way, District 9 is hosting this year's Convention, from August 17 to 19, 2012 at the Agricultural College's Niagara-on-the-Lake campus. The theme for the Convention is Gardening Then and Now, 1812-2012.
